PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .

January 15 – North Carolina Senator Linda Garrou spoke to us and brought information/updates from Raleigh. She is currently serving her 6th term and does plan to run for re-election. She is the lead Chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee. As with our own budgets, often time budget decisions are tough to make – with no apparent “good” option. Despite the tough economic times, North Carolina has retained its #1 AAA Bond ranking. Stimulus money we received went toward education and Medicaid programs. Proposed legislation, this fiscal year, should promote job growth, and positive investments were made in the State’s university infrastructure.

January 22 – In addition to some beautiful pottery, Phil Morgan of the N.C. Museum of Traditional Pottery talked about Seagrove. Seagrove is the oldest pottery community in the country, and it all dates back to pre-colonial days. Original uses of pottery were head/foot stones. During the 1970s, the number of potteries shrunk to 10. A local community college started pottery classes in the hopes of creating more interest. The N.C. Museum of Traditional Pottery was formed in the 1980s. All different types of pottery are made in Seagrove, and Phil has his all over the world. Today there are 96 potteries, but if you go to Seagrove and stop at the museums and galleries in downtown, you may or may not be getting Seagrove pottery. Get a local map and head out of town in search of the potters and
