## **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .**

### **January 27 – NASCAR**

Managing Director, David Hoots, was today's speaker. David grew up close to Bowman Gray Stadium and loved attending their races. He began his career by scoring races at Bowman Gray.

NASCAR was born at Bowman Gray, at this season starts the 64<sup>th</sup> season. NASCAR is privately held with 2000 employees in North America. There are 9 racing series and 1100+ races per year! The NFL is the only sport with a larger fan base. David has been in the sport for years so has seen its evolution. What you see looks like men just driving in circles, but there is lots of strategy that goes into each race. Daytona Beach, Florida is NASCAR headquarters but there are offices all over the U.S. David works from the R&D headquarters in Concord, NC, where he manages the Track Services Department.



### **February 3 – Dr. Ian Taplin's subject was "Is there a**

**Future for the N.C. Wine Industry?"** Dr. Taplin is a professor in the sociology department at Wake Forest, but has an interest in how the N.C. wine industry has come about and grown. North Carolina has the 2<sup>nd</sup> fastest growth rate in this industry, with 120 wineries across the state. As he has studied the history of wine making in North Carolina, Dr. Taplin has found that the Moravians



were in the forefront of making wine. Actually, they drank a lot of wine. During the early 1800s, the grapes had to be doctored so that wine could be made. During the 19<sup>th</sup> century you had tensions between two believing parties – those that thought drink was abhorrent and those that partook. Prohibition really ended the wine making industry in North Carolina, but the 1930s saw its resurgence. More recent, the 1970s saw some attempts, especially at Biltmore, to make wine, but it was a struggle. More education about how to spray for insects caused a huge growth during the 1980s in this industry. Wineries are actually part of the Department of Commerce, and most of them are small and struggle while there are only 6 or so "really big players" in North Carolina.
