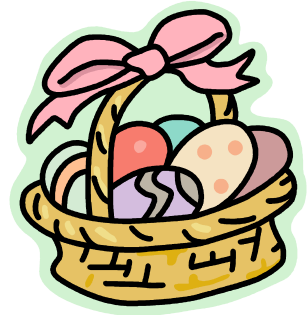

U.S. congressman introduces resolution to issue Rotary Centennial stamp

U.S. Congressional Representative Brad Sherman (Republican-California) on 25 February introduced a resolution urging the United States Postal Service to issue a [commemorative stamp](#) in honor of Rotary's 100th anniversary and the organization's efforts to eliminate polio worldwide.

"Rotarians are volunteers who support thousands of humanitarian and educational projects that benefit each of our communities," said Congressman Sherman. "The commemorative stamp will recognize Rotary's first 100 years of public service."

"Rotary was founded 100 years ago in Chicago, and now its influence can be felt not only in the United States, but also around the globe," said RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe, in response to news of the proposed resolution. "It is fitting that the organization is honored in this way."

Congressman Sherman was joined by 31 congressional co-sponsors in supporting the proposal to honor Rotary International's centennial anniversary with a postage stamp.

Nearly one third of Rotary's more than 1.2 million club members are based in the United States.
