PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .

May 25 – We met today at Senior Services, with a presentation by Richard Gottlieb, Director. Richard has been with Senior Services for 26 years. The beautiful facility that is Senior Services came about as the result of a *very* successful capital campaign. Senior Services also operates the Elizabeth & Tab Williams Day Center. Just think -- 950+ folks received lunch through Meals-on-Wheels today while we were eating our lunch. Started in Forsyth County in 1962, 3 million meals-on-wheels have been served. Richard shared stories with us about giving/receiving, and how many times you don't know which you are – the giver or the receiver. Richard encouraged all of us to "Give Until It Feels Good". Thanks to Ann Adams and the Golden Apple for providing a delicious lunch!

June 1 – Senator Jim Broyhill was today's guest and brought a spectacular program on the "Insiders Look at the U.S. Capitol". Using a video presentation, he showed us the Capitol – which is the most recognized building in the world. In 1814, following the burning of the Capitol, there was discussion about whether to move the Nation's capitol to another location. After deciding to keep the Nation's capitol in DC, it was expanded during the 1859-1863. In 1865 a new dome, "Statue of Freedom" was installed. The Capitol has held inaugurations. It has 540 rooms, 5 floors, and ¾ million square feet of space. It's Rotunda is a gathering place for visitors and an area for ceremonial occasions. The House Chamber is where the State of the Union is held, and has 450 seats. In the Senate Chambers, senators have his/her own desk. The Capitol has a Prayer Room as well as the tomb of George Washington. While the tomb is in the Capitol, President Washington's remains are at Mt. Vernon. A new 508,000 square foot visitors center is slated to open in 2008.
