May 19 – **Milton Rhodes, CEO** of the Arts Council spoke to us today. The Sawtooth Center has become center city, due to the changes/growth taking place in downtown Winston-Salem. There are 80 organizations that are involved with the arts in this community. That translates to between 400-500 events that go on each year in downtown Winston-Salem. Mr. Rhodes plans to add to that; he is hoping for 1,000 arts events a day (1 at lunch time; 2 in the evening). The Arts Council of Winston-Salem and Forsyth County was the first of its kind in the nation. Now there are over 4,000 just councils across the nation. Arts programs such as Fun with Fiddles, a symphony ensemble group and opera performances are some of the things that all the public school students are exposed to.

### President's Message

Dear fellow Rotarians,

*Cooperation* is a key word for the future of Rotary. Every area that we work in, such as education or water management or hunger and health, is big - very big. Rotary has already proven the importance of working with other organizations through our polio eradication program. We have set a precedent for how a service organization can cooperate with other organizations, governments, communities, banks, and foundations to reach an important goal.

Rotary has two great assets: our network of more than 1.2 million Rotarians and our trademark, the Rotary gearwheel emblem. These make our organization very appealing to other entities who might want to collaborate with us. But we must be very careful when we choose our partners. In the business world, huge companies buy other huge companies not because they want another factory or 10,000 more employees but for the simple fact that it can be a less expensive way of getting a product with a well-known brand - a trademark, if you will. Rotary has such a trademark in our Rotary emblem, and we must protect the integrity of that wheel. It must never be for sale.

When we talk about cooperation, there are some Rotary leaders who are afraid of such a step. They are afraid that in cooperating with others, Rotary risks losing its identity. I do not believe in this fear. We have not lost our identity in working with the United Nations to eradicate polio. To the contrary, we have strengthened our identity. There is no question that we would never have been able to make so much progress toward eradicating polio by ourselves. Likewise, the United Nations would never have been able to do it without our support - a good example of cooperation at its best.

Cooperation, however, must not only take place on the global level. I have seen a great many examples of how clubs and districts work together with various local entities, and I can assure you that in no case has Rotary lost its identity. Again, Rotary has won with cooperation.

I urge Rotarians, clubs, and districts to continue to look for partners when conducting a project, large or small. There is nothing but profit in partnering as long as we remember that our network and our trademark remain forever ours and that they are not for sale.

Rotary is a wonderful organization, and we are certainly moving forward in this first year of the second century of our history. Let us continue to do so through *Service Above Self*, showing the world the great leadership of Rotary International.
