## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .

May 2 - Dr. Stan Macaden and Dr. Santosh Benjamin of Bangalore Baptist Hospital in India and Dr. Ed Shaw of WFUBMC gave a presentation on Radiation Therapy and Hospice Care. Bangalore Baptist Hospital (BBH) is a mission hospital, part of the Baptist State Convention. Nearly 1/10 of all cancer cases are found in India, with 800,000 new cases each year. Breast and cervix cancers among Indian women are by far the most common, and are usually found in advanced stages. The BBH was founded 30 years ago, so now they are trying to see how to provide good quality end-of-life care. A group of doctors/nurses/ministers have started their own sort of hospice care. They travel as a group to see patients, and they try to empower the patients' families to look after the patient. The people of India are spiritual people, so it is only right that the BBH has the motto "To serve anyone that walks in, in the name of Jesus Christ."

May 9 - It looked more like a party than a Rotary meeting! The meeting room had been decorated with colorful balloons, jump ropes and playground balls. Our Centennial Project kick-off today featured students, staff, and the principal from Cook Elementary School. A Centennial Project must have 4 criteria: very real need, local Rotary club just have an impact, opportunity for both volunteer (hands-on) and \$ support, and the community should have a heightened awareness of what Rotary is all about. Dr. Pamela Pelc, Principal of Cook Elementary School gave a passionate speech of why Cook is deserving of our efforts. Cook has approximately 260 students, with 98% being minority, 1 student is white, and 7 are Hispanic. A small PTA, fair to poor parent support, and not a lot of money for extras are the norm. She and her staff are most appreciative of what she sees as our collaborative efforts having a positive impact on the students and the entire school. Ms. Michelle Michael, Curriculum Coordinator told of the Accelerated Reading Program, which is a great motivator for children, as 44% of their children work at grade level. At Cook, staff work towards accentuating the positive while caring for the whole child. The school holds awards ceremonies for such things as great attendance and good behavior/citizenship. The children visiting with us today then sang for us. Following that, the Community Service Committee gave a brief slide show about how we can help. Perry Peterson has drawn up plans for what we can do to help make a better playground. Adding such things as picnic tables, hopscotch and bucket toss areas, upgrades to the ball field, and benches/landscaping will benefit youth for many years to come. We were encouraged to help other ways as well. If you like, you can volunteer to tutor, be a "lunch buddy", attend book sales, award ceremonies – in other words, be surrogate family or special adult that the child can interact with. When you give, you get so much more back than what you gave! We have a chance to have a real impact!

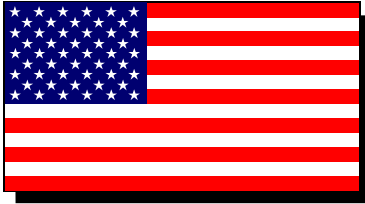
"Some Overtime Required." Some time each night and some time each weekend.
