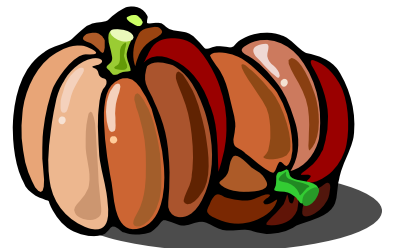

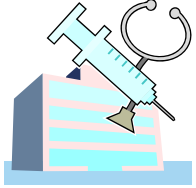

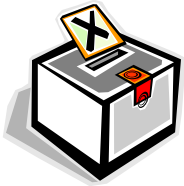

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .

October 27 – George Bryan, the President and CEO of the Methodist Children's Home was today's guest. Do you know the reality of today's children? Many have had on average 8 placements before making it to the Children's Home. Many have never known what it is to be loved; many have been beaten; many are diagnosed as Bipolar or having ADHD; some are often times called evil. The Children's Home – much more really. It's having a place to swim, a climbing wall or two, animals such as goats and poultry, being able to grow and sale your own vegetables, a stately church in which to worship or just have a quiet place to reflect, it's having a dining hall and good meals each day. In 1907, Methodists purchased the Davis Academy, built buildings and housed orphans. In the 1940's as many as 400 kids lived at the Children's Home. Today there is 212 acres that make up the campus, with approximately 50 buildings. Kids have changed; not only do they get food and shelter, but the Home treats various issues that the kids have. Now there is more focus on foster care and foster care adoption. There is still a school on campus and out-patient therapy. How can we help the Children's Home? They are always needing mentors, need someone to work with the animals, and folks to build or paint things. In addition, the Home has the best picnic area in town, along with a challenge course and ropes course that companies often utilize. For company meetings, they have complete conference facilities, along with overnight accommodations. George ended his presentation by inviting us to stop in a take a look at today's Children's Home.

November 3 – The beginning of flu season has arrived, so it's timely that Dr. Jon Abramson from WFUBMC



talked with us today about the Flu Pandemic. Influenza is the leading cause of vaccine preventable deaths. An Epidemic is when a portion of the population is susceptible, and kids under the age of 2 have the highest rate of those hospitalized. A Pandemic is when the entire population is susceptible, and at least 50% of the population is infected. Within the last 300 years, the U.S. has had 10 pandemics, and it is about time for another. The pandemic of 1918 was the deadliest and worst by far. Now, the H5N1 virus is causing concern, but it may or may not turn into the next pandemic. The medical community face challenges such as maintaining quarantine, maintaining infrastructure, a duration of 2+ years, along with vaccine development. Once a vaccine is developed – enough for the majority of the population – then each person would probably require 2 doses.
