## **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS . . .**

September 16 – Our own Special Combined Committee of Community Service, Benevolence and Foundation were our program today. Tom Bosworth spoke first, telling us that Rotary is all about Vocation, Fellowship, Service, and International activities. Programs such as our involvement at Cook School are indicative of Reynolda Rotary community involvement, however if these things are to continue, we must continue our monetary support. By combining these committees, there will not be the image of competition between committees for our dollars. So let’s begin. Support of the Rotary Foundation: By giving \$1000 to the Foundation, the donor is made a Paul Harris Fellow. Major Donor status is achieved at a \$10,000 donation (usually made in a lump sum); if you choose to give smaller amounts yearly to the Foundation, then you will be a Foundation Sustaining Member. Let’s say you’ve given \$1000 and are a PHF, but you continue to contribute to the Foundation. Money contributed over the initial \$1000 is a dollar-for-dollar contribution that earns Recognition Points. Example: if you’ve contributed \$1,050, then you would have \$50 in Recognition Points. These points can be combined with monetary contributions to enable someone to become a PHF. ● John Bost spoke about some of the various programs that use these Foundation funds. Clubs can apply for Humanitarian Grants (Matching Grants, District Simplified Grants). Educational Programs such as Ambassadorial Scholarships, Cultural Scholarships, World Peace Scholarships, and Group Study Exchange are all funded from your contributions! Near and dear to John’s heart is the Operation Smile© program. That’s what tugged on his heart and encouraged him to become a PHF – knowing that a portion of his \$1000 contribution would go to help a child. ● Ralph Holthouser told us the many ways our Benevolence contributions are used locally.

Just this past year alone, contributions were made to Host Homes, Forsyth Jail & Prison Ministry, and Prodigals. Benevolence funds also support our work with the Poznan Rotary Club, the World Affairs Conference, and the RYLC. ● Tom took the microphone back to tell us that \$25,500 has been budgeted by Benevolence for this Rotary year. We – as a Club – get a lot out of what we are able to do for others. Contributions are tax deductible and many companies have matching programs. The goal for our Club this year is:

- ◆ 100% Participation in both Foundation & Benevolence
- ◆ \$100 per member contributed to the Rotary Foundation
- ◆ \$200 per member contributed to the Benevolence Fund

September 23 – Dr. Andrew Brod, an economist from the Bryan School of Business and Economics at UNC-G brought us today’s program. Strangely enough, his talk was entitled, “Good News about High Oil Prices”. One and one-half years ago, oil prices were at \$30 per gallon; today, they are \$65 per gallon. According to Dr. Brod, we are ending the era of cheap gas. Why are gas prices rising? It’s not because of:

government taxes  
greedy oil companies  
price-gouging retailers  
supply problems

Gas prices are rising due to the structural change in the shape of the demand for oil. No new oil refineries have been built in the US in the last 30 years, though oil demand is being driven by 4 out of 6 people on the planet. However, higher prices are actually better than having a shortage of gas or gas lines as we did in the late 70’s. Since 1981, there has never been wide-spread fuel outages. As the world gets back to normal following recent

hurricanes, we will witness a shift in the market; people will make different live-style choices. Companies will strive to be more efficient; new sources of energy must be discovered. At some point in the future, oil prices will just be too expensive, so other means such as wind, electricity, solar, will have to be looked into and further developed.
